

"LEST WE FORGET"

One hundred and forty five 69th Infantry Division members are buried in American Military Cemeteries in Europe. Ninety-two graves are at Margraten in the Netherlands and fifty-three graves are at Henri-Chapelle, Belgium. Each year on the 25th day of April a floral offering consisting of one red rose is placed on each grave in memory of our departed comrade.

It is a credit to our country and to the American Battle Monuments Commission to see the beautiful cemeteries which are so meticulously maintained in these foreign lands. It makes a visitor feel very proud to know that these heroic men are enshrined in such tranquil surroundings.

If ever you have the opportunity to visit Europe, make it a part of your trip to see these two cemeteries. There is a representative of AMC on duty 24 hours of every day who will assist you in locating any special grave you might want to see.
