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

We will meet at the **Boston Park Plaza Hotel** from Wednesday, August 15th to Sunday, August 19th, for our 1979 Reunion.



Can anyone tell me how many times we went through basic training?

Was born January 11, 1900.

At a later date we received a letter from **Lester Langley**, 129 Walnut Street, Ottawa, Illinois 61350, H&S 269 Eng., who was trying to claim the Oldest Member Honor, as his birth date was November 3, 1905. However **Mr. Van Horn** (who we have written about above), has **Lester's** birth date beaten by 5 years and 10 months.

Then our many Beer Parties at the Mess Hall, whenever the PX would divide-up all of the profits to various Companies, every couple of months.

We were all — both young and old at the time, and were all training together to be Infantry Soldiers — Not really, truly, knowing what was in store for us about a year later. How we would take many long marches, and be very tired as we approached Camp. Lo and Behold — They would put the Division Band at the gate to play some "peppy marching tunes," so we would forget how tired we were . . . and the blisters on our feet would not hurt anymore.

We were kids of 18 and 19 years then.

Then the Shipping Lists coming in to the Division every month or so . . . Often wondering what had happened to some of the guys after they were shipped out.

Have lots of memories of Camp Shelby and the surrounding area. — Marching in and around the Camp . . . Saw many little towns which we would normally not have seen otherwise.

Then our Ship Out, and saying goodbye to Buddies we had cultivated during the past year. Those were the days, and memories will always remain.

Keep up the good work — and as the ranks are thinning — Let's keep together.



Russ Keyser Writes

One of our 69th Members who participated in the Friday Night Beer Party — Barbershop Singing — at our Reunion in Pittsburgh, sends the following about his group of singers and the good they are doing in this area, and across the country. They made for a good Friday night of entertainment for all of us in Pittsburgh.

Entertaining those in attendance at the Pittsburgh Reunion of the 69th Infantry Division Association on Friday evening of the Reunion week was the "Three Rivers Barbershop Chorus," representing the Greater Pittsburgh Chapter of the SPEBSQSA, INC. This mouthful of initials stands for the "Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America, Inc." — a male singing organization which started inconspicuously at an informal gathering in the Muhlenbach Hotel in Kansas City in 1938. The purpose of the meeting was to gather men of good will together to enjoy fellowship and to sing songs of the turn of the century, in four part harmony, unaccompanied by musical instruments, and without printed arrangements, literally "woodshedding" the chords by ear.

The idea of this type of singing caught on immediately, and sparked men's enthusiasm and spread like a brush fire until now, forty years later, we are an international male singing society of over 33,000 members in the United States, Canada, and several foreign countries. The largest male singing society in the world! The Pittsburgh Chapter was chartered in 1945 and was the first to be formed in Pennsylvania.

Within our chapters we have a chorus and also quartets, each of which sings the same type of four part close harmony. Most chapters present an Annual Show to their public, presenting their chorus and several quartets. During each year they also sing at Veteran's Hospitals, Homes for the Aged, Churches and Community Groups. We are proud that many of our society quartets have been selected to be part of USO Groups sent abroad to entertain our servicemen at overseas bases. Among those selected were two quartets from the Pittsburgh Chapter, the Circle W Four, and the Pittsburgh Four. One member of our Three Rivers Chorus is Russ Keyser (Maj-AUS, Ret.) who was an Executive Officer of Co.-H 273rd Inf. Regiment, during the "Brown Shoe War."

Our Society service project is the Institute of Logopedics in Wichita, Kansas, which is an institute that provides treatment to children who have communication problems, primarily due to birth defects or illness. During their treatment, the children live at the institute in small groups in family sized cottages, with house parents in each cottage. It has been discovered that many forms of music help to break down the communication barrier between these children and the world at large. Most of our choruses and quartets contribute a portion of their fees to the support of this institute, having contributed in excess of two million dollars to date.

The Three Rivers Chorus is proud to have entertained the men of the Fighting 69th Infantry Division. There are many fine Barbershop Choruses throughout the United States, so if you enjoyed our singing and would like to hear more, just contact a chorus in the city where your convention is being held.

I see by the last edition of the Bulletin, and also by hearing Vernon Wirth, when he stopped here on his way back home from the 1978 Reunion, that you and the rest of the Officers and Committee have sure been kept busy with membership, Reunion and other problems which have arisen in the last year.
